ENGAGING MEN TO PREVENT GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

Woza Moya hosted a Gender Based Violence workshop for men at Mashakeni hall to educate them about GBV and domestic violence related issues. The workshop was attended by Mr Ndaba from *Lifeline* and Mr Bhede the social worker from Lufafa Multipurpose. The key focus points discussed included recognising GBV, domestic violence, the various forms of abuse, what men can do to end GBV and where to get help. In his speech Mr Ndaba, shared the importance of social norms that need to change to stop GBV against LGBTQ+: "It is your time now to champion against gender-based violence," He said

NEW JOURNEY FOR ECD PRACTITIONERS

Early learning plays a critical role in child development, as it deeply affects the future physical, cognitive, emotional and social development. In realisation of this Woza Moya in partnership with *Kinderfonds MAMAS* has committed to fund seven ECD practitioners from outlying creches to further their studies. The ECD practitioners are enrolled at *TREE* in Durban for Further Education and Training Certificate in Early Childhood Development (NQF Level 4). The sessions take place one week per month for 12 months.







EMBRAICING OUR CULTURES THROUGH SOCIAL PRACTICES

On 17 September we organised another Heritage event but, strictly for the Afterschool programme, Good Guys Club and Powergirls. This event was attended by 129 children including Department of Health Ixopo, who brought in the Adolescent Youth Friendly Services (AYFS). Adolescents face many health and social challenges which put them at a higher risk of unwanted pregnancy, we invited the Department of Health to help reduce the impact of teen pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections.

While the youth can attend clinics during operational hours to access healthcare services, many facilities in our local lxopo Clinic have dedicated programmes and staff to support teenagers even after school between 14:00 – 16:00 from Monday to Friday, but this becomes impossible for almost all of our youth to access these services because to get to town where you find a clinic you must first catch a taxi to town. So to ensure their schooling is not disrupted we always make sure we bring such services closer to them, where they will not pay.
