BIRTH REGISTRATION

We have seen a rise in unregistered births in the Ufafa Valley in the past year. This is a major issue facing the community and not registering a child denies them access to many of their rights. Woza Moya held training for local school teachers, ECD practitioners, afterschool facilitators, paralegal advisors and community care givers. Yasmin Rajah, Director of *Refugee Social Services* conducted the workshop, explaining the importance of birth registration, the legal processes involved, and other very valuable information on the topic. We hope this training will help the vulnerable children of our community and improve their quality of life in the years to come.

INTERSEXION IN SCHOOL

A new program has been implemented this month at Sinevuso Secondary School. Intersexion is a unique episodic drama series with twenty-six independent but interrelated episodes that follow the infection of HIV though a range of different characters and their personal stories. This program is targeted at grade 8 learners, aiming to increase openness, honest relationships, and to use this as a strategy to reduce the spread of HIV/ Aids and teenage pregnancy in schools. The learners are exposed in many social issues when arriving in high school, this will help them make good decisions through their journey.
